	by a person younger than 18 years of age, the person shall have the ignition interlock device installed for 6 months for the first offense and for at least 2 years for a second offense.
	A DWI defendant who is placed on probation and who is otherwise permitted to operate a motor vehicle shall be required to operate vehicles equipped with ignition interlock devices for not less than 6 months. In addition, the licensing agency may require any person seeking reinstatement of their driving privileges to use an ignition interlock device on their vehicle. This requirement can apply to either occupational restricted or regular driving privileges. Exemptions: Medical.
Vehicle impoundment	Impoundment, vehicle forfeiture
Open Container laws	Open container must be in locked glove box, trunk, or otherwise inaccessible to driver and passengers, but does not apply to passengers of hired vehicles or motor homes longer than 21 feet.
